- Population: 53.9 million
- Male: 48 %; Female: 52 %
- Population Growth Rate: 3 %
- 45% aged below 15 years
- GDP growth rate: 6 %
- GDP (Per Capita, 2016): \$932
- Poverty Rate: 47 % (12 million); 60% of women live in extreme poverty (2015)
- Gender Inequality Index Score: 0.553 (significant gender gaps in human development)
- Women's time spent on unpaid care & domestic work: 5 times more than men
- 28% of married women are not participating in decisions about their own health and 54 % have no say on major household purchases (NBS, 2016)
- Girls married before 18 years old: 40%
- Women in Parliament: 36.8%;
- Women Cabinet Ministers: 19%
- Elected Women in District Councils: 5%
- Urban population: 33 %; Rural population: 67%
- Agriculture amounts to 77% of employment
- 80% Female Labor Force in Agriculture; 73% of landholders are men and only 27% are women
- 54% of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises are owned by women
- Maternal Mortality Ratio: 556/100,000
- Physical violence (15-49 yrs., F): 40 %
- Sexual violence (15-49 yrs., F): 17 %
- 58 % of women and 40 % of men believe that a husband is justified in beating his wife.
- Adult HIV prevalence: 4.7 % (Women: 5.8%; Men: 3.6%)
- Women and girls undergone FGM: 7.9 million

Women's Leadership & Political Participation



- Under Wanawake Wanaweza Phase I (2014 – 2016):

- **49 % increase** in number of women contesting for parliamentary positions between 2005 and 2015
- **47 % increase** in number of women elected as MPs between 2005 and 2015
- All **22 registered political parties** empowered to promote leadership and political participation of women, youth and persons with disabilities.
- **10 laws and bills** were reviewed to incorporate gender-responsive legislation and budgeting; ZEC, ORPP and NA adopted Gender adopted Strategies.
- **30 action plans** to advance women's leadership and political empowerment implemented and adopted by religious and community leaders in 8 regions in Mainland and 4 regions in Zanzibar.
- 100 media personnel and 20 Tanzanian media houses trained on gender-responsive and PWD-sensitive reporting for better coverage during the election cycle

- **Wanawake Wanaweza Phase II (2018 – 2021)** will build on lessons learned from Phase I and aim to achieve Women lead and participate in decision-making at all levels.





- **Support to Government to undertake Gender Policy Reviews:** National Trade Policy; Agricultural Marketing Policy; National Economic Empowerment Policy (Mainland); Zanzibar Empowerment Policy; National Employment Policy; Small and Medium Enterprise Policy; development of the Informal Finance Group Guidelines; Agriculture Sector Development Programme II;
- **Gender Impact assessments** of 14 Gov. Entrepreneurship Empowerment Funds; Gender analysis of the Integrated Labour Force Survey (2015-16); national scale mapping study of Gender in the extractives industries (2016) and Cost of Gender Gap in Agriculture
- Establishment of **11 Cross-Border Trade Platforms;** Women's **Value Addition Center** (Mainland); Barefoot College for **women solar engineers** (Zanzibar)
- High Level Panel on WEE scaled up to establish platforms in 30 regions in Tanzania
- 8,628 **women entrepreneurs** empowered to conduct profitable businesses; **925 Maasai Women have Land Titles**
- **100 adolescent girls** acquire entrepreneurship skills development for **green energy business**

Ending Violence against Women & Girls



- **The Legal Aid Act and National Plan of Action (NPA)** to End Violence Against Women and Children for Mainland Tanzania and in Zanzibar are successfully launched
- **5,513 women accessed legal aid** and other informational services
- Launched Tanzania's first ever **training material on Human Rights and Violence Against Women and Children cases; National Training modules on GBV; Working Protocols** for handling GBV cases in Police Gender Desks; **Legal Aid training manual**.
- Six survivor-focused **Gender and Children's Desks in the Police Force** fully operational; **4,500 police trained** on how to handle GBV cases; **42 judicial officers and law enforcers trained** on how to handle VAW Court cases
- **11,8002,655** men and women reached with EVAW messages through exhaustive **media campaigns**



Normative Work

- **CEDAW:** Support in submission of the combined 7th and 8th periodic CEDAW report in 2016; Preparation of the mid-term CEDAW report submitted to UN in March 2018; and preparations of the CEDAW full report to be submitted in 2019
- **UNCSW:** participation & preparations of the UNCSW national reports
- **Gender Policy:**
 - Mainland: Support on-going review and development of the new Gender Policy and its implementation strategy;
 - Zanzibar Gender Policy and Implementation Strategy (2016)
- **Gender-responsive planning and budgeting:**
 - **GRB tools** and manuals utilized by 5 **Local Government Authorities**, for education, improved infrastructure, sanitation, water facilities in schools and market places in Kashapu and Morogoro District Councils
 - **Time-Use Module** integrated in Household Budget Survey 2016/2017
 - National **Gender Operational HIV Plan** disseminated to Regional and Council HIV/AIDS Coordinators in 26 regions. Gender Equality mainstreamed in District HIV Plans for 2018/2019. Gender-sensitive guidelines-minimum package in prevention & response to HIV/AIDS disseminated to 23 districts
 - **WLHV Network** advocating at district and ward levels
